

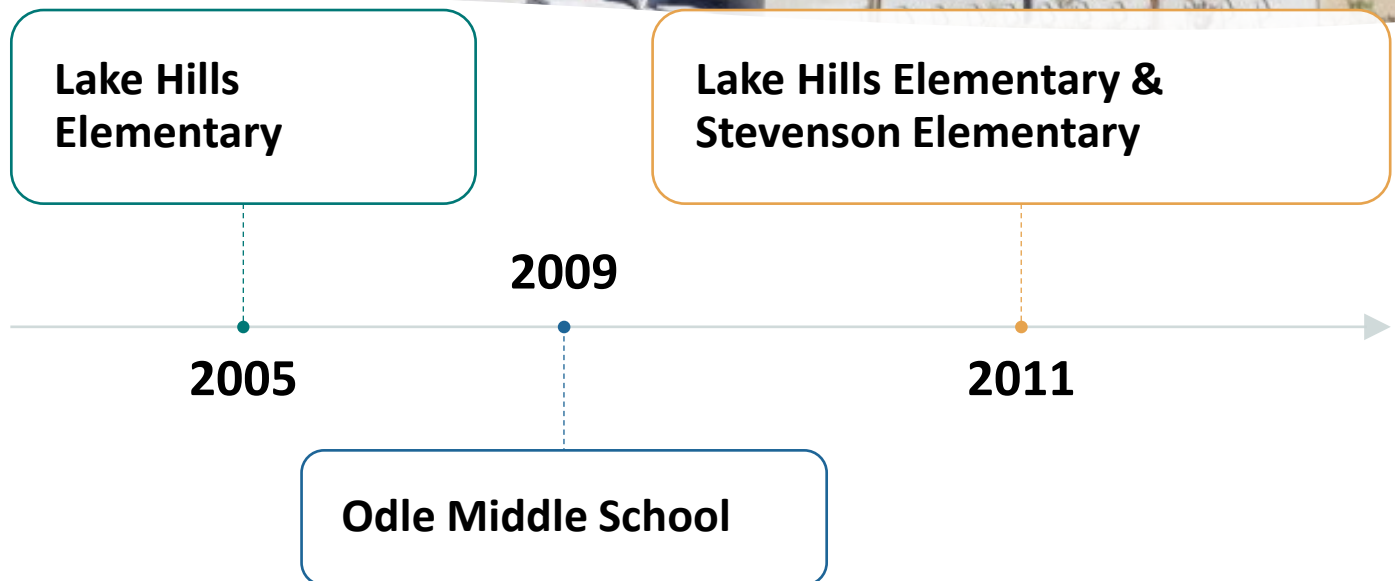

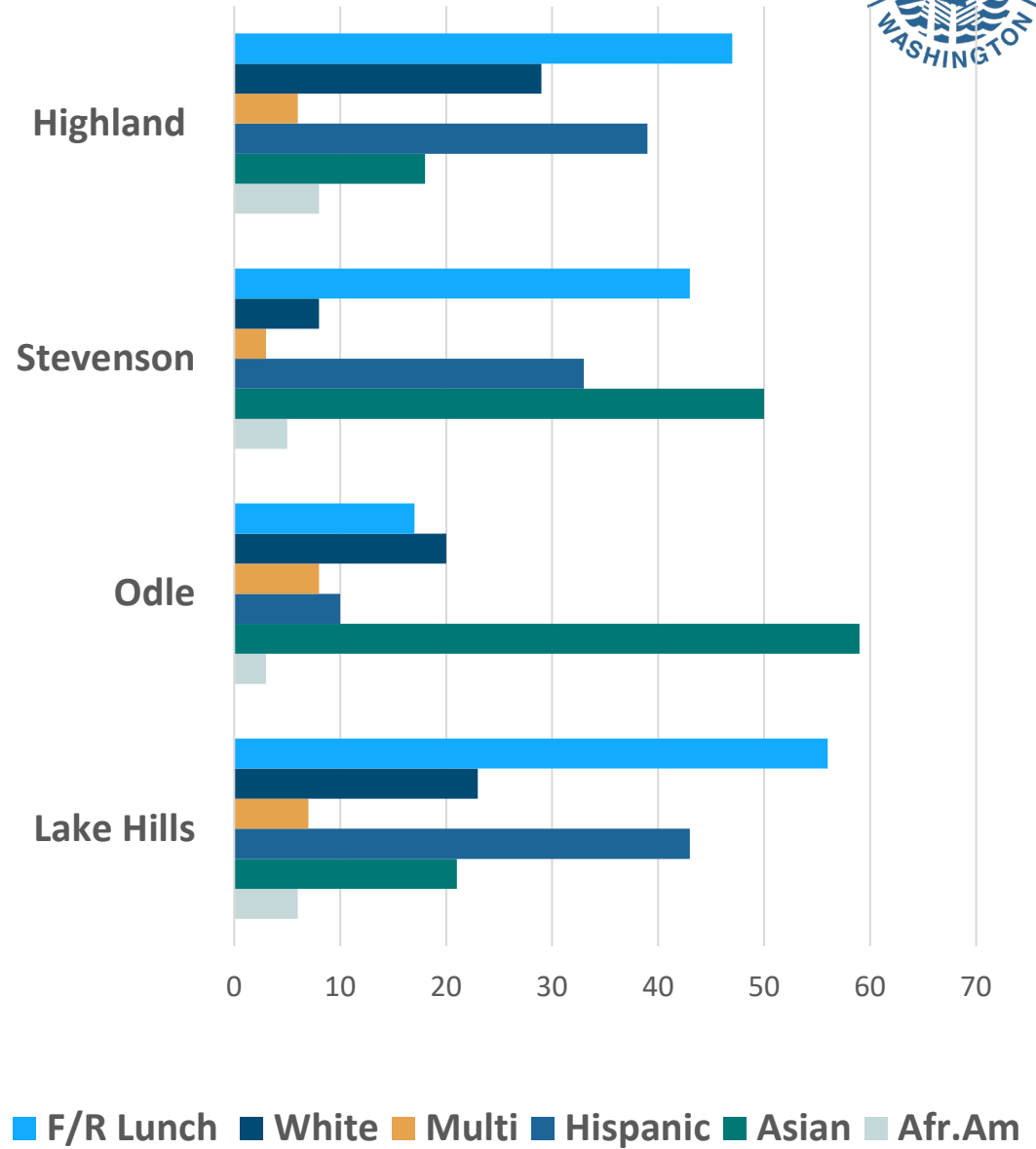

Stevenson Needs Assessment

- Youth surveys identified the following as top needs:
 - School nights with fun activities and games (75.58%)
 - Holiday and cultural celebrations (61.05%)
 - Sports activities (59.20%)
 - Snacks (54.07%)
 - Access to more summer activities, such as swimming (54.02)
 - Outdoor activities, such as biking or hiking (48.85%)
 - Arts (45.99%)

Stevenson Needs Assessment

- Top themes from parent surveys include:
 - Neighborhood can help to “Provide additional programs for before and after school” (85.19%)
 - Top supports parents feel are most helpful are “Academic supports, tutoring, homework help” (77.78%)
 - Biggest challenge facing the community is “Survival, economic needs, basic needs” (70.37%)
 - Parents would like to learn more about “Legal services” (58.85%)



Stevenson Needs Assessment

- Staff identified the following as immediate needs:
 - Case management Support for Families
 - Emotional and mental health support for students
 - Access to activities for students in the natural environment such as hiking, walking, etc...
 - Tutoring and afterschool homework help
 - Additional Health Resources such as full-time school nurses or onsite health clinics
 - Kindergarten readiness



Stevenson Needs Assessment

- Community stake holders identified:
 - Transportation to afterschool programing as a primary challenge
 - Staffing for currently offered afterschool programing
 - Housing and economic stability of families
 - Language barriers
 - Potential trauma exposure (especially for youth recently arrived to the country)
 - Behavioral challenges and access to social emotional learning



Lake Hills Needs Assessment

•Themes from youth surveys include wanting to see more of the following activities:

- Holiday celebrations 85.3%
- School nights with fun activities and games 79.9%
- Snacks 56.1%
- Sports activities 55.9%
- Access to more summer activities, such as swimming 55.3%
- Access to more winter activities such as skiing, ice skating 49.2%
- Outdoor activities, such as biking or hiking 46%



Lake Hills Needs Assessment

- Primary parent survey themes include:
 - The largest challenge facing the Lake Hills community is “Parents having to work multiple jobs (limits time at home to help child with homework) 86.5%”
 - The neighborhood can contribute to the success of youth by “providing additional programs for before and after school 81.9%”
 - The types of supports parents feel are most helpful include “Academic supports, tutoring, homework help 79.9%”
 - Parents would like to learn more about the following community resource “Before and after school childcare programs 52.8%”



Lake Hills Needs Assessment

- Themes from staff survey and focus groups:
 - High degree of need for additional math/reading support
 - Kindergarten Readiness
 - Organized Sports and Activities
 - Health Services and Nutrition Education
 - Mental Health and Counseling
 - Crisis Intervention and Case Management
 - Social Development Opportunities such as leadership skills and critical thinking



Lake Hills Needs Assessment

- Community Partners Focus Group Theme:

- Building use at Lake Hills as the biggest challenge including cost, policies, and availability
- Language barriers
- Potential trauma exposure especially for youth recently arrived to the country
- Behavioral challenges and lack of access to social emotional learning
- Virtual learning for some students who have difficulty with concentration
- Transportation and lack of access to after-school care
- Not having access to materials/curriculum taught by the school at the after-school programs they attend
- Lack of continuity of resources



23-24 Needs Identified

- Clothing and Basic Needs
- Housing and Shelter
- Childcare
- Academic Support
- Legal Resources
- Decreased sense of Safety
- Difficulty w/ Navigating Services

Current services that are successful in addressing needs

- Continued investment in rental assistance services
- Free legal resources
- Afterschool opportunities that are easy to access, flexible and offer scholarship and transportation
- Local childcare subsidies as well as navigators to help apply for these services
- Flexible Emergency assistance funds to address unmet needs in the community (e.g., utilities, clothing, emergency hotel stays)
- City mediation services between tenants and landlords
