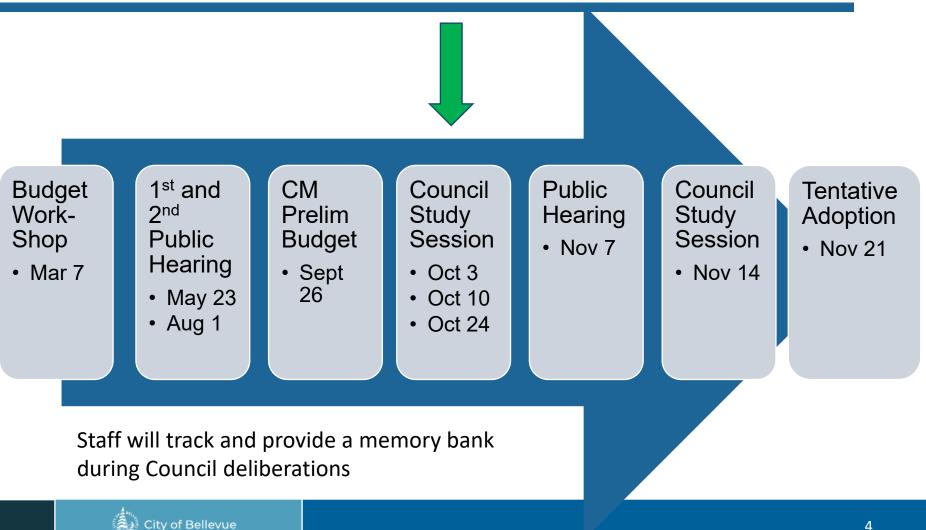

Public Safety



Fire Station 10 – Supports Growth

- Reduces travel time for areas served by FS10
- Went out to bid as of September 22, closes November 3
- Expected 12–18-month construction timeline
- Budget includes:
 - Final Staffing need of 6 FTES in 2023
 - Up front costs such as new apparatus
 - CIP includes funding for construction





Growing and Changing Community

Current situation

- 37% increase in calls for service over past decade
- Total number of patrol officers remained static
- Rapid growth
- 19% uptick in crime 2017-2021

Community Events

- Increased staffing and expertise
- Approximately 30 events per year
- 1-36 days commitment per event





Growing and Changing Community

- Community Engagement
- Target enforcement
 - Data-driven to address crime hotspots
 - High visibility and undercover anti-crime operations

Supplement Patrol

- 911 response
- Community policing
- Increased visibility
- More time on calls







Eastlink Transit Unit

• Up to an additional 52,000 daily riders in Bellevue

Regionalizes Bellevue

- Large events; Mariners, Seahawks, concerts
- Easy access to and from Bellevue

Expectations

- Increase in calls for service
- Elevated community concern





Eastlink Transit Unit

Eastlink Transit Unit

- Specially trained for light rail's challenges
- Patrol platforms, park and rides, restrooms
- High visibility patrols reduce crime and fear of crime
- Available for rapid deployment

Partnership Liaison

- Sound Transit
- Social Service Agencies
- BDA
- Neighborhood Associations





Community Crisis Assistance Team (CCAT)

- Compassionate Alternative Co-responder Model
- CCAT Pilot May-August 2021
 - 33% fewer people booked into jail or admitted to hospital
 - 72% of CCAT responses were initiated by 911 calls
 - CCAT officers spent 82% more time on calls

Aligns with OIR recommendations

- Community concern regarding interactions with people in crisis
- 24% decrease in use of force

Homelessness Outreach Program

Supplemental outreach/housing access (\$600,000)

- Outreach staff
- Housing navigation
- Vehicle residence compassionate enforcement
- Encampment resolution
- Community engagement and response

Safe parking pilot program budget (\$450,000)

- 12-month pilot
- Funds operational contract and on-site services

• Shelter (\$400,000)

• Support successful shelter programming, including transition to new permanent men's shelter location

Small Business Recovery & Critical Human Services



City of Bellevue received \$20M

- Council appropriated \$8M in 2021:
 - Housing Stability
 - Small Business
- "Be incurred" by December 31, 2024, spent by December 31, 2026
- Preliminary Budget includes allocating remaining \$12M
 - \$10M to Human Services; with 2.4M in 2022
 - \$2M to Small Business Recovery



Critical Human Services

- Pandemic exhausted safety-net resources for many low- and moderate-income Bellevue households
- All indicators predict that increased human service needs will continue post-pandemic

Critical areas of need:

- Housing Stability
- Homelessness Services
- Basic Needs
- Food Insecurity
- Civil Legal Aid
- Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Survivor Services
- Well-being in the Face of Racial and Ethnic Discrimination

- Shelter

- Childcare

- Behavioral Health

Critical Human Services

- \$10 million ARPA funds allocated to address critical human service needs
 - \$2.4 million to be appropriated in October 2022 to address immediate need for housing stability assistance
 - Solution \$7.6 million allocated for 2023-2024 biennium
 Solution
 Sol
 - \$2.7 million: Additional housing stability assistance
 - \$1.6 million: Critical 24/7 shelters
 - \$3.1 million: RFPs for critical areas
 - \$303 thousand: Staff costs for program administration



Small Business Recovery \$2M

- Work directly with businesses and non-profit organizations that support them through business engagement and outreach
- Business Survey, business engagement meetings, and data show the two largest challenges to recovery for small retailers are:
 - o continuing absence of daytime workers
 - o Staffing turnover



Small Business Recovery

- Funds will support temporary programs for existing businesses that,
 - 1. improve businesses' productivity
 - 2. improve customer acquisition
 - 3. improve employee training and retention
 - 4. provide access to resources and spaces that support business resiliency
- Staff will look for partnership opportunities with nonprofit organizations



Safe, Clean, & Vibrant City



Safe, Clean, & Vibrant City

Council Vision: "Our residents live in a safe, clean city that promotes healthy living and well-being."

- \$300K investment over the biennium
 \$200K in 2023, \$100K in 2024
- Enhance outdoor clean-up
 - $\,\circ\,$ Organize volunteers for adopted places
 - $\,\circ\,$ Provide safety and collection equipment
 - $\,\circ\,$ Develop standards and metrics
- Unwelcome markings
 - Develop ordinance on graffiti
 - $\circ~$ Provide qualified assistance for private property removal

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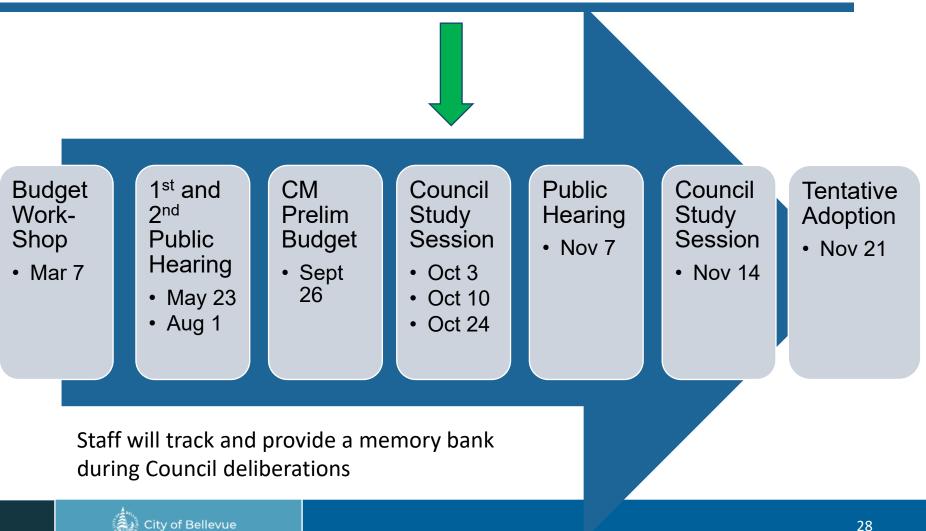
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
