Right now, we pay the full amount but many of us only use their service 1/4 of the time. This is not fair to us seniors and does not represent an equitable policy decision. Seattle offers this type of reduced service at a reduced cost and so does Portland, OR. Why can't Bellevue?	Let them know there are a lot of us seniors living in Bellevue who want to stay in our homes and this consideration would help reduce the costs of home ownership we are all facing at his stage in our lives. We need help from the city government to negotiate a new contract with Republic Services.
