

Crime Trends vs. 2024

Property Crimes

- Shoplifting is down 19% (199 less crimes)
- Motor Vehicle (MV) Theft is down 69% (275 less crimes)
- MV Prowls are down 40% (260 less crimes)
- Theft of mail is down 76% (218 less crimes)

Person Crimes

- Rapes and sexual assaults are down 38% (6 less crimes)
- Simple assault is down 10% (36 less crimes)
- Violation of orders up 14% (17 more crimes)
- Aggravated assault up 17% (11 more crimes)
- Harassment up 23% (26 more crimes)

Looking Ahead

Community Crisis Assistance Team (CCAT)

- Funded by Council in 2023
- 1,472 individuals contacted, 59% repeat contacts
- Mental Health Professionals for Crisis Response Team (CRT) operations



Bellevue Light Rail Unit (BLU)

- Officers work in pairs, create positive, safe environment on Link trains
- No major incidents on light rail
- Ridership increasing, BLU will be essential once Link connects to Seattle
- Sporting Events and World Cup 2026
