Whereas: domestic violence is a serious crime impacting individuals of all socioeconomic

backgrounds, races, genders, faiths, orientations and abilities; and

Whereas: domestic violence is widespread and has a devastating impact on survivors,

children, families, and our community; and

Whereas: from 1997 to 2024, 399 domestic violence incidents in King County have resulted

in fatalities - including 305 homicide cases, 70 suicides and 24 cases involving law

enforcement intervention; and

Whereas: the Bellevue Police Department responds to an average of 1,200 domestic

violence cases each year, with more than 700 incidents already reported in 2025;

and

Whereas: historically marginalized populations - including LGBTQ+ individuals, people with

disabilities, immigrants and refugees, people of color and Indigenous people - experience some of the highest rates of domestic and sexual violence, along with

additional systemic barriers to safety and support; and

Whereas: education, prevention and intervention efforts to end the cycle of domestic

violence are essential not only to protect survivors, but also to raise public

awareness of its severity, prevalence and far-reaching impacts.

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of the City of Bellevue, Washington, on behalf of the City Council, do hereby proclaim **October 2025** as:

Domestic Violence Action Month

in Bellevue, Washington, and urge all residents to speak out against domestic violence and support local efforts to prevent and end abuse in our communities.
