Whereas: Filipinos have lived in the United States for over 425 years, beginning with the earliest

documented proof of Filipino presence in the continental United States on October 18, 1587, in Morro Bay, California. The Philippines became an American territory in 1898,

following the Spanish American War; and

Whereas: The first known Filipino in the Seattle area worked at the Port Blakely Lumber Mill on

Bainbridge Island in Washington Territory around 1883; and

Whereas: Washington state is home to the third largest Filipino population in the United States,

and Filipino Americans are the largest Asian Pacific American population in the state, with

the vast majority calling King County home; and

Whereas: In November 1903, the United States government passed the Pensionado Act, providing

funds for Filipino students to study in America. By 1912, 209 Filipino students had graduated from American college or university programs. The University of Washington enrolled the highest number of Filipinos of any institution in the United States; and

Whereas: Filipino Americans have lived and worked in Bellevue for decades, contributing to our

city's growth, vibrancy and economy; and

Whereas: Filipino American History Month provides an opportunity to promote the study of Filipino

American history and culture and recognizes the contributions made by Filipino

Americans; and

Whereas: today, as leaders, business owners and workers across all industries, Filipino Americans

enhance Bellevue's community and culture.

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, mayor of Bellevue, Washington, on behalf of the City Council, do hereby proclaim October 2024, as:

Filipino American History Month

in Bellevue, and urges all community members to celebrate the history and contributions of Filipino Americans to the Bellevue community.
