Whereas: The relationship between the Netherlands and the United States is the longest

unbroken, peaceful relationship with any foreign country; and

Whereas: From the very beginning, Americans and Dutch were drawn together by mutual

ideals. The Pilgrims resided in the Netherlands for ten years before they set sail

for the New World. During the Revolutionary War, the Dutch people demonstrated their widespread sympathy for the American struggle for

freedom; and

Whereas: The ties between the United States and the Netherlands dates back to the early

17th century, when the Dutch West India Company founded New Netherland and its main settlements, New Amsterdam and Fort Orange—known today as

New York City and Albany; and

Whereas: Thousands of American soldiers are buried on Dutch soil, having given their

lives in the liberation of the Netherlands during the dark days of World War II;

and

Whereas: From the earliest days of our Republic, people of Dutch ancestry have made

important contributions to American history and culture with generations of Dutch immigrants enriching the United States with the unique customs and traditions of their ancestral homeland—a country that has given the world great

artists, celebrated philosophers and leaders of international business; and

Whereas: Dutch-American Heritage Day is celebrated in both the United States and the

Netherlands to celebrate the long-standing friendship between the two

countries.

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of the City of Bellevue, Washington, and on behalf of its City Council, do hereby proclaim **Nov. 16, 2024,** as:

Dutch American Heritage Day

in Bellevue, and urge all residents to join in celebrating the relationship between the Netherlands and the United States, and to recognize the contributions of Dutch Americans to Bellevue and our nation's culture and history.
