



- Planning and Design for remainder of City Hall facilities





- Focus on broadening outreach to Bellevue's diverse communities
- Improving transparency
- Leveraging community input data





Cultural Events in Bellevue

- Community-led, City Supported
- Prioritize community partnerships
- International Festival
 - 13 partners
 - 21 countries represented
- Welcoming Week
 - Bellevue Diversity Advisory Network
 - 30 partners







Cross-Cultural Center & Programs

- Cross-Cultural Center without Walls second year of funding
- Community-Led, City-Supported
- Additional15-20 communitybased organizations
- 20 40 cross-cultural events
- Fall 2025 Fall 2026





Cross-Cultural Center & Programs

2024 programming has shown:

- Continued demand for crosscultural engagement
- Growing network of cross-cultural partners
- Building trust and positive relationships between city and CBOs
- Consistent challenges in finding venues for programming



Cross-Cultural Center & Programs

- Update siting analysis and options for a Cross-Cultural Center (with walls)
- Preliminary Site Opportunity
 Analysis completed in 2019-2020
 - Changes in plans for city-owned properties since then
- New information available through:
 - Final Cross-Cultural Feasibility Study
 - Cross-Cultural Center without Walls Pilot Program






Recreation:

Building on 2023-2024

- Increased number of youth with disabilities in day camps
- Facilitated an increase in large-scale special events in parks: 23 in 2023 to 41 in 2024
- Incorporated feedback from pickleball and tennis community to increase shared access for all
- King County (VSHSL) awarded grant to NBCC to support a services hub for older adults
- Recreation registrations and event participation have exceeded pre-pandemic levels



Policy Informed Decision Making

Human Services Strategic Plan

Expand equity-focused and data-driven decision-making that best addresses the most significant community needs, prioritizing investments in the areas of greatest disparities for Bellevue residents.

Increase the capacity of Bellevue's human services system by providing equitable access to human services funding opportunities, to support organizations in meeting the needs of and reducing disparities among Bellevue's most marginalized residents.

Expand access for Bellevue residents to culturally and linguistically specific human services.

Increase key stakeholders' awareness regarding the City's human service needs, including disparities by community, and serve as a catalyst to collaboratively address those needs.
