



# Comprehensive Plan Periodic Update Scope of Work Summary

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## Project Purpose, Desired Outcomes and Exclusions

This project will update the City's Comprehensive Plan to meet state and regional requirements, Council's 2021 Vision, and other topics of importance to the community and Council. In particular, the update will include changes to Elements throughout Volume 1 of the plan and accompanying map amendments to distribute the City's growth targets. Volume 2 of the Comprehensive Plan (sub-area plans) will only be updated as they relate to map amendments and policies that would conflict with either those map amendments or other updates to Volume 1 policies. A Housing Needs Assessment and associated updates to the City's Affordable Housing Strategy will work in tandem with this update but are outside of its direct scope.

## Major Scope Items

The following list identifies the primary elements required within the scope of work. An expanded list framed by the Council Vision is included on the following page.

- Identify overarching growth target distribution approaches (housing + jobs).
- Evaluate impacts of growth distribution through an environmental impact statement (EIS).
- Recommend specific map amendments to achieve growth targets and other goals.
- Explore amending the land use classifications used in the Comprehensive Plan map to reference zones more broadly.
- Incorporate changes required within the Housing Element, particularly related to housing choices, affordability levels, and distribution.
- Consider incorporating a new Climate and Resiliency Element and required related additions.
- Address equity throughout all Elements of the plan, including addressing historic inequities and evaluating the impacts of current trends and planned amendments.
- Update the Comprehensive Plan to set the stage for future functional plans.

The update will strive to make the Comprehensive Plan as clear and concise as possible while serving as the guiding policy document for the City.
