


TFP Purpose

Two purposes:

 - Foundation for CIP Updates
- Basis for Impact Fee program



TFP Revenue – 2019-2034 Tax Growth in Dollars



Transportation Calls on Transportation and General Fund Revenues

- Debt Service for Transportation Projects (\$15M/year)
 - 2013 \$70M GO issuance
 - 2015 \$79M GO issuance
 - TIFIA \$101M
- Maintenance (shift and fund)
 - Shifted overlay and other operating in Capital back to Operations (\$10-\$15M/year)
- 2025-2030 CIP
 - \$349.2 Proposed CIP, which identified needs
 - Less Contra (-\$157.5M) to adjust for affordability
 - Net \$191.7M, including Grand Connection I-405 Crossing
- Financial Risks

TFP Revenue Forecast - 20 years

- Existing CIP is only partially funded, includes more project costs than five year's (2026-2030) revenue will support.
- 20-year timeframe corresponds to Comprehensive Plan horizon, aligns land use and transportation planning.

TFP Candidate Project Identification

Sources included:

- Current, 2022-2033 TFP
- Mobility Implementation Plan (MIP) Performance "Gaps"
 - Vehicular network
 - Pedestrian network
 - Bicycle network
- ➤ Bike Bellevue project concepts referred to TFP process
- Comp. Plan transportation analysis shows locations where intersections may fall short of target level in 2044.

TFP Candidate Project Evaluation

- A. 25 projects (and 12 other ongoing programs) in the 2025-2030 CIP are carried forward into the new 2026-2045 TFP by default.
- B. 68 other candidate projects were evaluated and prioritized:
 - 1. Project Scoring, using the MIP framework
 - Separate scoring framework for each mode: Vehicle, pedestrian, bicycle
 - 2. Considered public comment, survey input
 - 3. Considered qualitative factors, including Council priorities, coordination with other departments/organizations and project investment to date.

TFP Preliminary Project List

Seven high-priority projects proposed for inclusion in TFP. These typically have phases or elements already underway and/or involve collaborations with others:


- TFP-110. 110th Avenue NE/NE 7th Street to NE 8th Street.
- TFP-219. NE 8th Street/106th Avenue NE.
- TFP-244. Eastrail/south city limit to north city limit.
- TFP-252. Bellevue College Connection.
- TFP-260. 120th Avenue NE/NE 16th Street to Northup Way.
- TFP-270. Spring Blvd (Zone 3) 124th Ave NE to 130th Ave NE
- Other-5. Bellevue Grand Connection: I-405 Crossing

Thirty-seven Additional priority projects – "Placeholders" in the TFP.

- Support transit mobility




