Community Center programs for people with disabilities; and

Whereas: Friends described Bill as the kind of person who would give you the shirt off his back in the

middle of a snowstorm; and

Whereas: We are grateful for his service, belief in the community and time and steadfast

commitment to the residents of Bellevue.
