Whereas: more than one million adults in the United States identify as transgender or

nonbinary - an estimated 1.6% of the adult population according to recent

national data; and

Whereas: Transgender, nonbinary and gender-nonconforming people contribute greatly to

Bellevue's culture and community, enriching the city's diversity and helping

advance equity, inclusion and understanding for all; and

Whereas: despite continued progress, transgender and nonbinary people still face

discrimination, barriers to opportunity and acts of violence, underscoring the

need for awareness, acceptance and collective action; and

**Whereas:** each year, Transgender Awareness Week raises visibility and promotes

education about the experiences of transgender and nonbinary communities, while encouraging allies to take part in building inclusive communities; and

Whereas: first recognized in 1999 following the death of Rita Hester, a Black transgender

woman, Transgender Day of Remembrance - observed on November 20 - honors the lives of transgender and gender-nonconforming individuals lost to violence,

and calls for reflection, compassion and change; and

Whereas: The City of Bellevue reaffirms its commitment to fostering a community where

every person is treated with dignity and respect. Each year, city staff and residents gather to observe Transgender Day of Remembrance and to read the names of those lost to violence, standing in solidarity with the transgender

community.
