people around the world by a wide array of ethnic and cultural groups, including but not limited to Afghan, Azerbaijani, Balochi, Chechen, Hazara, Kazakh,

Kurdish, Kyrgyz, Lezgin, Pashtun, Iranian, Tatar, Tajik, Turkmen, Uighur and Uzbek peoples, each bringing their unique customs and traditions to this joyful

occasion; and

Whereas: Nowruz, celebrated through centuries-old traditions, symbolizes a time of

personal renewal in harmony with nature and an opportunity to come together

in community; and

Whereas: Bellevue is home to many people who celebrate Nowruz who are valuable

members of our community, making significant contributions to our city's

cultural diversity, economy and society; and

Whereas: As a holiday that reflects on leaving behind the challenges of the past year while

embracing hope for the future, the spirit of Nowruz continues to inspire us to

foster compassion, unity and peace.

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of Bellevue, Washington, on behalf of the City Council, do hereby proclaim March 20, 2025, as:

Day of Nowruz
