





Engagement Example: Housing Stories


- "Our now adult son can't afford a one bedroom apartment anywhere in town."
- "I was a student at Bellevue College [and] unhoused for a brief amount of time. [It] drove me to seek work and housing is Seattle."
- "A 55 and over subsidized apartment building is the only way I can live here comfortably."
- "I'd like to stay in Bellevue but I'm not sure where I'll find housing."

Would you like to own a home in the future if you can afford it?




Do you support Middle Housing in your city even if you cannot afford it? (Bellevue responses, 228)

Bellevue residents support new middle housing development

"Please indicate your level of support for increased housing, including townhomes, apartments and condominiums."

Throughout Bellevue



Younger residents strongly support new middle housing development

60% Bellevue residents are under the age of 45

Approximately **80%** of support new housing development **throughout the city**.

Approximately **75%** support new housing development **in their neighborhood**.



Older residents less supportive of new middle housing development

24% Bellevue residents are over the age of 55


Approximately **50%** support new housing development **throughout the city**.

37% of residents ages 57-75 and **19%** of residents ages 76 and older support new housing development **in their neighborhood**



People desire different mix of housing depending on age

Renter vs. Owner support for new middle housing development

53% Bellevue residents own their home

55% of homeowners support new housing development **throughout the city**.

35% of homeowners support new housing development **in their neighborhood**.

47% Bellevue residents rent their home


80% of renters support new housing development **throughout the city.**

74% of renters support new housing development **in their neighborhood**.



Both renters and owners want diverse mixes of housing

- One House per Lot

- Mix of Small Condos, Apartments, Townhomes, Single-Family Homes & Duplexes
- Mostly Apartments and Condo Buildings

Housing forums revealed nuanced desire for more housing

Preference

- Walkability & third places.
- Community building
- Variety of housing types
- Homeownership opportunities.
- Preserve the tree canopy
 & green space
- Support affordability

Concern

- Will more housing help housing prices?
- "cohesion, not chaos."
- Loss of trees and open space
- Bus service

There is need for more housing, especially affordable housing
