Background

Traditional billing - bimonthly

National trend toward monthly billing

Monthly billing has been requested as a service by customers

Current state:

Meter reading and billing system limitations

Future state:

- Automated Metering Infrastructure (AMI)
- Customer Information and Billing System (CIBS)
 Project 2023

Evaluation

Why bill customers monthly?

- Enhanced customer service
- Easier household budgeting
- Promotes water conservation
- Reduces risk of delinquencies
- Improved revenue stability



Evaluation (cont.)

What keeps a utility from moving to monthly billing?

- Cost of meter reading
- Cost of monthly billing
- Billing system limitations
- Administrative burden
- Change management

Current cost - bi-monthly billing (status quo)

Category	2023	2024
Bill print	\$66,982	\$68,757
Postage	\$100,000	\$102,650
Check payment processing	\$25,000	\$25,663
Merchant fees	\$776,872	\$818,046
Total	\$968,854	\$1,015,116

Fiscal Impact (cont.)

Additional cost of monthly billing

Category	2023	2024
Bill print	\$33,491	\$66,982
Postage	\$42,500	\$85,000
Check payment processing	\$12,500	\$25,000
Merchant fees	\$151,813	\$319,718
Total	\$240,304	\$496,700

Policy Issues

Two policy options are considered:

- 1. maintain the status quo, with billing on a bimonthly cycle; or
- 2. establish a policy to transition to monthly billing.

Staff recommendation: Option 2
