

TFP Overview

The Transportation Facilities Plan is a 12-year "financially constrained" plan:

- Provides the first level of citywide project
 prioritization (to identify projects for funding in the CIP);
- Includes environmental review (to evaluate impacts of 12 years land use growth on the transportation system and other elements of the environment); and
- Vehicular capacity projects in the TFP form the basis of the Transportation Impact Fee Program

- Additional considerations (qualitative)
 - Investment in project to date (public process as well as dollars)
 - Opportunity to coordinate with others, e.g., WSDOT, adjacent development
 - Public input




- 16 projects fully funded in current, 2021-2027 CIP

- f. 18 projects to build out bicycle network.




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
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
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
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
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Project List—"Reserve" Allocations

- ➤ Congestion Reduction Levy Placeholder, \$15.9m
 - Priority projects for next 4-5 years have been determined.
 - Priorities for years 5-12 are still TBD, via ongoing evaluation, scoping process. Placeholder funds are for the projects yet to be determined.
- ➤ Neighborhood Sidewalk Placeholder, \$18.3m
 - Priority projects for next 4-5 years have been determined.
 - Priorities for years 5-12 are still TBD, via ongoing Neighborhood Sidewalk process. Placeholder funds are for the projects yet to be determined.
- > Transit Master Plan Transit Connections Reserve, \$2m
 - Facilitates pursuing emerging opportunities, collaboration with Metro.

New MIP Metrics

New MMLOS performance metrics and targets developed for Mobility Implementation Plan

Evaluated Preliminary Proposed Project list (71 projects).

- ➤ <u>Vehicular</u>: Shows proposed projects align with locations where system performance is expected to lag in future.
- > Transit: Improves performance for several O-D pairs
- Pedestrian: Reduces system gaps by 5 miles (reduction from 12% of system to 8% of system)
- <u>Bicycle</u>: Reduces system gaps by 8 miles (reduction from 24% of system to 18% of system)



108th Avenue NE Downtown Spine, NE 4th St – NE 8th St


Coordinates with planned development to set curb line, preserve mobility as density increases.




