

City of Bellevue Proclamation

- Whereas: During Black History Month, we recognize and celebrate the many achievements and contributions made by Black people to our nation's social, artistic, cultural, political and economic advancement; and
- **Whereas:** The story of Black History Month begins in 1915, half century after the thirteenth Amendment abolished slavery in the United States. In 1926 Harvard trained Historian Carter G. Woodson announced the second week of February to be Negro History Week; and
- Whereas: In 1976, Black History Month was formally adopted to honor and affirm the importance of Black history throughout the American experience; and
- Whereas: The observance of Black History Month calls our attention to the continued need to battle racism and build a more just society that lives up to our democratic ideals, and it serves as both a celebration and a powerful reminder that Black History is American history; and
- **Whereas:** The disturbing events our nation has endured over the last several years reminds us that we have far to go to end racial injustice and inequity in our nation and local communities; and
- **Whereas:** The City of Bellevue is strongly committed to ensuring access, equity, inclusion and opportunity for all; and
- Whereas: We strive to raise awareness of the history and contributions of communities of color through the city's Black History Month events, including our featured speaker and author Merritt D. Long on Feb. 1.

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of the City of Bellevue, Washington, and on behalf of its City Council, do hereby proclaim the **month of February 2022** as:

Black History Month

and urge all residents to join us as we reflect on our shared history; commemorate and reaffirm the contributions of Black people to our communities, our country, and to the world; and continue efforts to battle racism and to build a society that is more just, peaceful and prosperous for all.
