### Data for all City of Bellevue human service funding in 2020 and 2021

Comparison of amounts requested vs. amounts awarded for *all* City of Bellevue human service funding in 2020 and 2021, comparing BIPOC By and For agencies to other agencies

Between 2020 and 2021, the City of Bellevue allocated over \$11 million dollars in pandemic funding, in addition to the ongoing human service funding that is distributed on a biennial basis. City Council encouraged the Human Services Commission to include a wide base of agencies and agencies providing culturally specific services in their funding recommendations.

It is important to note that the Bellevue City Council has prioritized funding for our shelters. As a significant portion of City of Bellevue Human Service Funding is dedicated to shelters, numbers are provided below, with and without shelter funding included.

## Percentage of all human service funding grantees in 2020 and 2021 that were funded for the first time?

2020: 7% of all agencies (3 of 44) received funding for the first time with 2020 human services funding. The 3 agencies are Community Homes, Inc., Bellevue LifeSpring and MAPS-MCRC.

2021: 4% of all agencies (2 of 49) received funding for the first time with 2021 human services funding. The 2 agencies are 4 Tomorrow and Centro Cultural Mexicano.

# Of all human services programs funded in 2020 and 2021, what are the percentage of programs that are BIPOC By and For programs?

2020: 13% (11 of 83) programs funded are BIPOC By and For programs 2021: 22% (20 of 91) programs funded are BIPOC By and For programs.

### Percentage of all human services agencies funded in 2020 and 2021 that are Eastside-born and Eastside-based

2020: 50% (22 of 44) agencies that received human services funding in 2020 were Eastsideborn and Eastside-based.

2021: 51% (25 of 49) agencies that received human services funding in 2021 were Eastside-born and Eastside-based.

#### Additional Efforts related to Equity in City of Bellevue Human Service Funding

- Technical Assistance was offered to all applicants through Communities Rise for the 21-22 COB Human Services Fund application process and the Behavioral Health and Housing Related Services application process. Technical Assistance is being offered for the 23-24 COB Human Services Fund application process.
- Bellevue revised the eligibility requirements for agencies applying for human services funds. The revised guidelines only identify requirements that are legally mandatory for agencies. This revision removes barriers that some agencies may have experienced in the past.
- Interpreters can/will be provided upon request at funding information sessions or any other city meeting to discuss human service funding.
- Bellevue accepts funding applications and quarterly reports in languages other than English.
- Bellevue is funding a capacity building initiative through Communities Rise that will begin in June 2022. This initiative will focus on supporting small/emerging and mid-size nonprofit agencies that provide human services to immigrants, refugees, communities of color, low-income and other marginalized communities residing in Eastside Cities with training and mentoring to further organizational development.
- All City of Bellevue Human Services Commissioners reviewing applications receive equity training.
