economic toll of all vehicle crashes in the U.S. annually exceeds \$400 billion; and

Whereas: Bellevue experienced 38 serious-injury crashes and five traffic fatalities total during

2020 and 2021, some involving distracted driving; and

Whereas: Talking on a mobile phone -- even in hands-free mode -- texting, adjusting your radio

or programming a GPS device can divert your attention away from driving and result

in distractions; and

Whereas: Bellevue residents and all Americans deserve to live in communities that promote

safe driving behaviors and healthy lifestyles; and

Whereas: Preventing distracted driving injuries and deaths requires the cooperation of all

levels of government, employers and the public; and

Whereas: Whereas the City of Bellevue and the National Safety Council works to promote

policies, practices and procedures leading to increased safety on roads and

elsewhere; and

Whereas: Bellevue's Vision Zero effort strives to eliminate serious-injury and fatal collisions

on city streets by 2030; and

Whereas: People drive more as the weather warms, with more vulnerable road users walking

and bicycling, it's imperative to focus attention on ways to prevent traffic crashes.
