# **GRANT ALLOCATION PROCESS**

Award recommendations are developed through an in-depth application process administered by the Arts Program and evaluated by an Allocations Committee appointed by the Arts Commission. The Committee considers the quality of the creative engagement, the public benefits generated for Bellevue residents and visitors, and the organizational capacity and sustainability of the applicants.

# **2023 FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS**

This year, the City of Bellevue received the most ever grant applications, totaling \$454,295 in requests from 53 applicants. The Allocation Committee recommends that a total of \$181,000 be allocated to 41 individuals and nonprofit organizations at their meeting on October 26th:

- \$126,000 allocated to 29 nonprofit organizations in Eastside Arts Partnership Support grants
- \$15,000 to three organizations in PowerUp for Equal Access
- \$35,000 allocated to 8 individuals and 8 organizations in Project grants
- \$5,000 to five organizations in BelRed Bonus

A list of each recommended allocation and a brief grant description is attached at the end of this action item.

# 2023 EASTSIDE ARTS PARTNERSHIPS ALLOCATIONS

#### About

Eastside Arts Partnership (EAP) Support grants provide operational support funding for nonprofits that provide annual arts, cultural, and heritage programs serving residents and visitors in Bellevue, Washington. Applicants can request up to \$10,000, or 50% of their operating budget. Applying nonprofits must have a 501 (c) 3 designation or a 501 (c) 3 fiscal sponsor and provide publicly accessible programming.

# Process and criteria for evaluation

Panelists separately reviewed and scored the applications on how well they demonstrated the stated criteria on a scale of 1-10. The scale consists of six qualities in ascending order from no achievement to most achievement: not competitive (1); fair (2-3); good (4-5); great (6-7); excellent (8-9); exceptional (10). Panelists provided scores for the following criteria:

#### **Creative Engagement**

- Quality and effectiveness of the organization's existing and proposed arts, cultural, and heritage programming and services to meet the cultural needs of participants and constituent groups.
- Extent of creative and civic participation by Bellevue's diverse residents and visitors.
- Meaningful creative and civic opportunities for working artists, cultural workers and volunteers.
- Diversifies the forms of art, creative experiences and cultural resources available to Bellevue residents and visitors.

#### **Public Access and Benefit**

- Quality and extent of public benefits offered to Bellevue residents and visitors.
- Significant access to cultural opportunities to under-served groups, or, demonstrates improved access by underserved people and communities.
- Effort and evidence of inclusive communications to new and underserved communities and communities, particularly those who speak a language other than English at home.

# **Organizational Capacity and Sustainability**

- Demonstrated financial capacity and stability.
- Strength of organizational management and governance.

Then, the panelists' scores were averaged into single scores for each applicant. These scores were used in distributing funding. The higher score an application received, generally more of their request was awarded.

# 2023 POWERUP FOR EQUAL ACCESS ALLOCATIONS

# About

When applying for an EAP Support Grant, applicants can choose to add on an application or the PowerUp for Equal Access bonus grant. The grant is a set \$5,000 award given to compelling applicants. This opportunity aims to fill arts and cultural gaps for underserved communities. The application is short, and applicants who were previously awarded PowerUp grants before 2023 are eligible.

What is an underserved community? Underserved communities are defined as, but are not limited to, those whose opportunities to experience the arts are limited by geography, ethnicity, gender or gender identity, economics, age, or disability. We also welcomed applicants to define for themselves what underservice in their community looks like. Organizations may focus on reaching a particular constituency; however, they may not be exclusionary under national civil rights laws and policies prohibiting discrimination. This extends to hiring practices and participant engagement.

The three PowerUp grants were chosen based on the strength of the applicant's application and alignment with the purpose and goals of the Power Up grant.

# **2023 PROJECT ALLOCATIONS**

# **Program Goals**

Project grants provide funding for arts, cultural and heritage projects that serve residents and visitors in Bellevue, Washington. We encourage innovative projects by artists, individuals, and communities that fill cultural gaps and inspire new forms of creative participation.

Applicants can request two levels of funding, \$1,000 and \$2,000. Non-profit organizations applying for a Project Grant may request up to \$3,000. Projects must take place in 2023.

# Process and criteria for evaluation

Panelists separately reviewed and scored the applications on how well they demonstrated the stated criteria on a scale of 1-10. The scale consists of six qualities in ascending order from no achievement to most achievement: not competitive (1); fair (2-3); good (4-5); great (6-7); excellent (8-9); exceptional (10). Panelists provided scores for the following criteria:

#### **Artistic Innovation**

- Quality and promise of the proposed arts, cultural, and heritage project to meet the cultural needs of an audience and constituent group.
- Innovative approach to foster creative and civic participation by Bellevue's diverse residents and visitors, particularly underserved people and communities.
- Fills a gap in art, cultural, or heritage offerings and opportunities not regularly available to Bellevue residents and visitors.

#### **Public Access and Benefit**

- Quality and extent of public benefits offered to Bellevue residents and visitors.
- One or more compelling, feasible public events in Bellevue are clearly described.

# **Project Feasibility**

- Demonstrated experience of project leaders to accomplish the scope and scale of the project.
- Evidence of thoughtful planning, including clearly articulated goals and processes for evaluation.
- Realistic budget and timeline.

For Project grants, applicants that scored higher received a larger percentage of funding based on their asking amount, similar to EAP grants. In some cases, the panel made recommendations for larger or smaller awards based on the feasibility of the proposal and its potential impact on Bellevue residents.

This add-on can be applied for in future years, even if the applicant is awarded the opportunity for 2023. If the applicant brings a successful project that helps raise awareness of the BelRed Arts District or activates a space in the district, the Allocations Committee that reviews projects may want to fund the project again.

The five BelRed Bonus grants were chosen based on the strength of the applicant's application and alignment with the purpose and goals of the grant, while also bringing a diversity of projects to the BelRed Arts District.
