Whereas: Human trafficking involves the use of force, fraud or coercion to obtain some

type of labor or commercial sex act. Every year, millions of adults and children

are trafficked worldwide – including in the United States; and

Whereas: The federal Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 established a commitment

to combating human trafficking domestically and abroad; and

Whereas: Every year since 2010, the President has dedicated National Human Trafficking

Prevention Month in January to raise awareness about human trafficking and to

educate the public about how to identify and prevent this crime; and

Whereas: Traffickers often take advantage of instability caused by natural disasters or

conflict to exploit others. In addition, human trafficking disproportionately impacts vulnerable populations such as American Indian/Alaska Native

communities, LGBTQI+ individuals, individuals with disabilities, undocumented

immigrants, youth experiencing homelessness and low-income persons, illustrating the importance of centering equity and justice in the efforts to

combat trafficking; and

Whereas: During this month, we honor the efforts of governments, organizations, anti-

trafficking entities, law enforcement officials, survivor advocates, communities of faith, businesses, and private residents here in Bellevue and around the world

who are raising awareness and working to stop human trafficking; and

**Whereas:** The City of Bellevue emphasizes that everyone has the power to help make a

difference in combating all forms of human trafficking by gaining knowledge to

recognize, report and reject these crimes.

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of the City of Bellevue, Washington, on behalf

of the City Council, do hereby proclaim January 2023 as
