

City of Bellevue Proclamation

- Whereas: "Women's History Month" celebrates the vital contributions of women to our society and recognizes specific achievements women have made over the course of history in a variety of fields; and
- Whereas: Women's History Month began as "Women's History Week" in 1981 when Congress authorized and requested the week to be proclaimed beginning March 7, 1982; and
- Whereas: In countless recorded and unrecorded ways, American women of every race, class and ethnic background have made historic impacts on the growth and strength of our nation, state and local communities; and
- Women, including women of color and immigrant women, have been leaders Whereas: not only in securing their rights of suffrage and equal opportunity, but also as prominent figures in the abolitionist movement, the emancipation movement, the labor movement, the civil rights movement, and other efforts, including the peace movement, which strives to create a more just society for all; and
- *Whereas:* We must reflect on the significant burdens women and girls continue to bear today, particularly women of color and immigrant women - including unequal wages, disproportionate caregiving responsibilities, lack of access to healthcare and loss of employment, further precipitated by the pandemic – while acknowledging that much more needs to be done to overcome these barriers; and
- **Whereas:** Equity, access, inclusion and opportunity for all people are values at the core of the City of Bellevue's community vision and the ongoing work of the Diversity Advantage Plan; and
- **Whereas:** Recognizing the importance of women's contributions helps ensure these efforts will not be overlooked in the literature, teaching and study of American history.

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of the City of Bellevue, Washington, and on behalf of its City Council, do hereby proclaim March as:

Women's History Month
