Whereas: The City of Bellevue acknowledges that Bellevue and surrounding areas exist on the

ancestral homelands of the Coast Salish people, including the Duwamish, who are the original caretakers of this land and are still here, fostering their rich and vibrant culture

and continuing to honor their heritage; and

Whereas: Three out of four native women will be physically assaulted in their lifetime. The second

leading cause of death for Indigenous girls ages one to four is murder, according to the Urban Indian Health Institute, while the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention lists murder as

the third leading cause of death for American Indian and Alaska Native women; and

Whereas: Since 2017, grassroots actions have grown at the local, regional, national and international

levels to recognize May 5 as a National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women to honor and call for justice for all missing and murdered Indigenous

women around the globe; and

Whereas: A National Week of Action on May 1-7 calls all communities to action in honor of the

thousands of missing and murdered Indigenous women across the United States; and

Whereas: Tribal governments and communities report the loss of Indigenous women is devastating

to both tribal communities and the nation, as insufficient resources and data, complex legal frameworks, underreporting of assaults and lack of clarity on jurisdictional responsibilities have exacerbated barriers and hindered efforts to locate those who are

missing; and

Whereas: Bellevue commits to continuing to nurture relationships and support our local tribal

governments and the community's efforts to increase awareness while pursuing and supporting equitable outcomes for tribes and communities of color as we honor the

experiences and wisdom of our diverse population.

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of the City of Bellevue, Washington, and on behalf of its City

Council, do hereby proclaim May 1-7, 2023, as:

## NATIONAL WEEK OF ACTION FOR MISSING AND MURDERED INDIGENOUS WOMEN AND GIRLS

in Bellevue, recognizing the unique and disproportionate rates of violence against this population and calling on our community to say 'enough is enough' by participating in virtual events, exploring available resources or organizing awareness activities in your community.
