Whereas:	The City of Bellevue provides opportunities to meet the changing needs of a more active, diverse older adult population; and
Whereas:	The Bellevue Network on Aging, a group of volunteers and staff, is dedicated to healthy aging in the community by promoting awareness of needs and resources that support older adults through life's transitions; and
Whereas:	The City of Bellevue engages older adults through education, recreation, and service, encouraging people of all ages to celebrate connections and resilience.
