SUBJECT: Public Engagement on the Long Range Financial Plan

The City Council has been in a sustained review of Capital Investment Program long range financial planning. The focus of this work narrowed in on identified gaps between citizen and Council priorities, and available funding in three specific areas (described more fully in materials presented on May 16, 23, and June 6):

- Options to address the need for significant mobility projects supporting growth in the City's BelRed and Downtown areas, including pursuit of a loan through the federal government's TIFIA (Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation) program;
- Funding for projects identified in the 2014 Fire Facilities Plan, including seismic upgrades at existing stations to ensure the ability to provide emergency response after an earthquake, replace aging infrastructure, and build a new fire station to serve the population centers of Downtown and BelRed; and
- Options to accelerate progress to complete a variety of smaller-scale transportation
 projects that improve neighborhood safety and connectivity for all users of the
 transportation system (pedestrian, bicycle and vehicles). While existing programs allow
 the City to fund a small number of safety and connectivity oriented projects annually, the
 backlog of demands is growing.

In addressing both the fire facilities and the acceleration of neighborhood safety and connectivity, the Council directed staff to pursue community feedback about a potential new voter-approved revenue. The table below provides an updated Community Outreach Plan, with the July 5, 11, 18, and 25 Council Study Sessions draft agendas noted. This draft plan will be updated as Council gives further direction.

Tonight, staff returns to provide you with a summary of the public engagement process and feedback received. As of this printing, staff is compiling the feedback and it will be provided in detail in your desk packet on Tuesday. Specifically, staff will provide:

- A summary and feedback received from the public open houses held on June 28, 29 and 30; and
- Interim results from an online survey, which went live on June 10.

The Transportation Commission met on May 26 and June 9 to discuss the potential Transportation ballot measure, and their feedback is attached for consideration (Attachment A). The Transportation Committee Chair and Vice-Chair will be in attendance to provide feedback and respond to questions if necessary.

No direction is being sought this evening. Staff will return on July 11 for direction on whether to continue to move forward with a voter approved ballot measure for the November election. More specifically, staff will be requesting answers to the following questions: (1) should the City proceed with both a fire facilities and a transportation neighborhood safety ballot measure? (2) if the City moves forward with both possible measures, should they be separated on the ballot or a combined measure?; (3) what is the rate and composition for each of the possible ballot measures?

The Council will decide as early as July 25 whether to place one or both of the possible ballot measures on the November ballot. The latest Council can take action in order to meet deadlines for inclusion on the November General Election is August 1. In order to move each of the possible ballot measures forward, the Council must take two actions: (1) adopt an ordinance explaining the measure and setting out the ballot language as it will appear on the November ballot; and (2) appoint pro and con committees that will prepare statements in favor of and in opposition to that ballot measure. The pro/con statements will be published in the voter's pamphlet. Each committee is comprised of no more than three people from the public, although an unlimited number of people can assist each committee if necessary.

In anticipation of Council's potential action on July 25, staff will ask members of the public to volunteer for potential pro and con committees. This call for volunteers will be done with the understanding that if no action is taken, the committees will be disbanded. Staff intends to make the call for volunteers through a press release, the use of the City's website and social media.
