first projects was raising money for a much needed playground in the low income

Whereas: Helen moved to Bellevue in 2001 and immediately went to work making the

community better. She volunteered extensively at Bellevue First Congregational Church, later Helen turned her considerable talent and energy to serving women in

need on the Eastside.

Whereas: Helen identified a need for shelter and other support for homeless women on the

Eastside and partnered with the YWCA to open Angeline's Day Center for women.

Whereas: Helen saw that the women using the day center had no safe place to sleep at night and

doggedly pursued a solution by finding space, raising money and hiring staff. The Sophia Way, which provided safe shelter, a meal and a hot shower to women with

nowhere else to go, opened in December 2008.

Whereas: Helen was the vision and heart behind increasing the capacity of the Eastside Winter

Shelter for women by finding larger spaces for the year-round shelter with the goal of

serving more women.

Whereas: Helen oversaw the opening of Sophia's Place at St. Luke's Lutheran Church in

Bellevue, an improved and larger year-round shelter facility that could serve an

increased number of homeless women.

Whereas: Helen will long be remembered for her commitment, compassion, leadership, and

hard work to ensure that the lives of all women on the Eastside mattered.
