Bellevue Friends of the Library (BFOL) contributed more than 6,000 volunteer hours and \$50,000 to programming at Lake Hills, Bellevue & Crossroads Libraries in 2016. Some examples of the impact include:

Future Challenges

As a public institution, the library faces a balancing act on number of larger social issues in order to ensure that all patrons feel welcome and safe:

- Homelessness
- Drug use
- Mental illness

NOTE - Support from Bellevue Police Department has been & is greatly appreciated. Continued cooperation from city on this and in other forms is important to help address these issues.

Changes to Downtown

Downtown development in the area has increased demand for parking in the area, despite the new garage, creating a crunch for library staff, volunteers & patrons.

Looking Forward...

KCLS Strategic Plan –

KCLS is in the process of developing its new 3-5 year Strategic Plan.

After a robust public process -- including surveys, public meetings, interviews with community leaders and staff & patron focus groups -- priorities have been narrowed to three potential scenarios: Connections & Navigation, Belonging & Skills Building.


