Council Priority: "Re-create a neighborhood program that supports neighborhood leadership, engagement and community-directed investment"

- Engage neighborhood and community leadership in collaborative process that enhances distinct neighborhood character.
- Provide community-driven process for small but important neighborhood CIP projects to get funded and built.

Lessons Learned


- Residents know their neighborhoods and engage about cultivating distinct neighborhood character
- \$150K per project limit acted as an artificial constraint to areas with larger budget allocations
- More time is needed for environmental, contracting, permitting and other regulatory process requirements (beyond 3 year turnaround)
- Enhanced outreach is needed to broaden participation of under-represented neighborhoods

- Adequate Resources for Small-Scale Neighborhood Improvements
- Near Term Completion

New Map


- Use new subarea boundaries consistent with Comprehensive Plan update
- 14 neighborhood areas Downtown/BelRed and Eastgate/Factoria combined.
- 2 areas per year
- Rotate a 7-year cycle Aligns with CIP



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

Implementation



- Project Manager assigned to project
- Local outreach effort
- Project complete within 3-5 years

Staffing

Proposed NEP 2.0 dedicate 14% of CIP budget (\$100,000 per year) to support administration of the NEP program, project development and corresponding "surge" of general and transportation requests.


Previous NEP had 1.3 FTE positions to support program
Responsible for outreach, overlapping NEP project management and coordination

Approved Budget One Proposal 115.21DA NEP-2.0 Neighborhood Enhancement Program

From 2015-2021, the allocation of \$725,000 per year (total of \$5.075M) would cover all CIP project costs for all NEP projects including staffing associated with program and project management.

NEP Comparison

- new Neighborhood Area Boundaries
- Removes the CIP project cap of 150K per project
- Aligns NEP cycle with 7-year CIP cycle
- Integrates prior public input into NEP project ideas for public consideration.
- Maintains high levels of public engagement
