What is Economic Development?

Work that improves community living standards, creates jobs and opportunities for residents, and generates revenue to support City's service delivery.

May include:

- Investments in infrastructure
- Investments in cultural amenities
- Recruitment or retention of companies
- Assistance for new business creation






Economic development benefits the local community.

- Intersection of resident, business, and visitor needs supports strong quality of life
- B&O and sales taxes support service delivery (parks, roads, etc.)
- Amenities like restaurants, stores, health services, etc. available to residents, visitors, and employees
- Businesses can be involved in public projects and public events.



Talent is driving our economic growth.


- The Seattle region has more top tech talent than the nation's most innovative metros.





Bellevue's worker population is different from its resident population.


Bellevue workers are **younger**, **more male**, and **less diverse** than Bellevue residents.

The city's economy is dependent on **both** high-wage tech jobs and lower-paid, lower-benefitted jobs (in tourism, retail, food, and transportation) which support them.


Given their varying demographics, Bellevue workers and Bellevue residents make different choices about their commutes.

- 60 years or over





Occupation Category of Bellevue Workers







Results from 2019 Business Survey

- Businesses are generally pleased with factors like safety, accessibility, continuing education options, and availability of qualified employees.
- Perhaps unsurprisingly, availability of affordable housing was the only metric that declined significantly between 2015 and 2019.

Primary Themes

Transportation

- Critical features: proximity to transit center
- Concerns: High cost of driving, increasing road congestion

Real Estate

- Critical features: Walkability, transit access, bicycle facilities
- Concerns: more neighborhood amenities needed



What we heard...

Transportation

Wants:

- improved pedestrian experience
- more intra-Eastside transit service
- transit priority lanes
- expanded bicycle options
- improvements to curb-space management
- shared shuttles

Real Estate

Wants:

- improved pedestrian experience
- more childcare options
- more public space
- active public spaces
- expanded food & beverage options



How we're responding...

Transportation

- New all-way crossing at 110th Ave NE and NE 6th St (2023)
- Wayfinding updates for bicyclists and pedestrians
- Lime bikeshare now official
- 108th Ave NE protected bike lane
- CommutePool pilot program for shared employee shuttles
- New shuttle drop-offs on 106th Ave NE
- UW study on improving urban freight and delivery access

Real Estate

- Additional requirements for pickup/drop-off and delivery space
- Meydenbauer Bay Park opened this spring, and a Master Plan process for Ashwood Park in north downtown is now underway
- Policy review and framework development for food truck use of public right-of-way
