Integrated Managed Care Panel-Information for the Commission

Background

In 2014 the Washington State Legislature passed Senate Bill 6312 that required integrated purchasing of mental health and Substance Use Disorder (SUD) services funded by Medicaid through managed care. This first step was accomplished in April 2016. The bill also requires full integration of mental health, SUD and physical health care through managed care contracts by January 1, 2020. King County opted to become a "mi-adopter" and began receiving incentive funds to accomplish this integration by January 1, 2019 with 2019 seen as a transition year moving toward full integration. The managed care model means that Medicaid funds flow from the State to Managed Care Organization; in King County there are five. King County Behavioral Health and Recovery Division still provides Crisis Services in King County and manages State and Federally funded programs such as detox services, Crisis Diversion and Children's Crisis Outreach Response System.
