

• Crew = 10 youth/2 supervisors


Priority given to Bellevue residents

2019 Project Accomplishments

- Kelsey Creek Park removed 4,680 sf of jewelweed, bindweed, and English ivy.
- Lake Hills Greenbelt removed 2,300 sf of bindweed, Himalayan blackberry, Evergreen blackberry, jewelweed, and thistle.
- Wilburton Hill Park removed 3,600 sf of Himalayan blackberry and English ivy and planted 200 native plants.
- Lewis Creek Park removed 7,223 sf of Himalayan blackberry and bindweed.
- Coal Creek Natural Area renovated 5,649 linear feet of natural area trail.
- City-Wide Trails completed routine maintenance on 34,302 linear feet of trails.
