



Context


Puget Sound Region: **2.75%** of national population growth

Jobs grew by **18%** but population grew by only **14%**





Economic Expansion: Perspective on growth

LU-9: "...achieve a mix of jobs and housing that makes it possible for people to live closer to where they work."

Implications:

- Longer commutes
- Higher housing prices


Economic Expansion: Many H1-B visa recipients

Women Not in The Labor Force



28% increase in the gap between the average household income for the top 20% and the bottom 20% of households

Income Inequality

45% of households with total income under full time minimum wage (\$28,080) support more than 1 person

Implications:

 There is substantial financial need in Bellevue

Income Inequality

A household with income at full time minimum wage (\$28,080) will be cost burdened with a rent over \$700/month

Households Paying Over 30% of Their Income for Housing

Household Income	Percent
relative to Area	Cost-
Median Income (AMI)	Burdened
Less than 30% AMI	77%
30% to 50% AMI	76%
50% to 80% AMI	56%
80% to 100% AMI	42%




Residential Character: Single-Family Homes Get Bigger

27% increase in very large homes









April 8-16

Reminder letters with paper questionnaire mailed to households who have not yet responded.

May - July 31


Census enumerators go door to door to collect information in person from households who have not yet responded. Online and phone portals remain open through the end of July.
