



- Whereas: Tens of millions of workers in the U.S. are employed in essential critical infrastructure jobs that must continue through the COVID-19 pandemic to maintain the services and functions Americans depend on daily, as well as the country's ability to operate resiliently during the pandemic response; and
- Whereas: Roughly a quarter to 30 percent of Seattle metro area employment is made up of workers in essential industries according to federal government data; and
- Essential workers include personnel working in 16 different sectors such as emergency Whereas: response, healthcare and public health, food and agriculture, critical manufacturing, information technology, transportation, water, energy, government services and other support functions for these industries; and
- Many of these workers are required to interface closely with the public in the course of Whereas: their work, putting their health on the line to meet the needs of our communities; and
- Whereas: An estimated 12% of workers in essential industries do not have public or private health insurance; and
- Whereas: Promoting the ability of these workers to continue working and staying safe during periods of community restriction, physical distancing, or closure orders/directives is crucial to community resilience and continuity of essential functions; and
- Whereas: Essential workers are a key piece of the continued functioning of our communities during this time of increased physical distancing and limited availability of services, risking their own safety and health in the execution of their duties to serve the public every day; and
- Whereas: Current health orders requiring continued use of physical distancing and personal protective measures means these workers in Washington will need to continue performing their essential work under trying circumstances in response to the public health emergency caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of the City of Bellevue, Washington, and on behalf of its City Council, do hereby proclaim on June 1, 2020 our continued support and recognition for the critical contributions of:
