
Land Acknowledgement


- **April**: Commission (PC) overview of Grand Connection vision and work associated with the Comprehensive Plan Amendments, Land Use Code updates, and design guidelines.
- **May**: PC review of draft policy language and changes to graphics and maps proposed for the Comprehensive Plan Amendments.
- December: Amendments to the Comprehensive Plan specific to Grand Connection accepted (December 10, Ordinance 6449)

- January: Informational staff presentation on the Sequence One Guidelines and Standards update





"My hope is that it will increase the amount of green space and art, and provide more shared community areas."


"Please add small play areas, especially between the museum and the transit center, and further into Wilburton."




Audits/Precedents: What have we learned?

Audits

- Strong intent needed
- Existing design components (Pedestrian Corridor) could be retained, refreshed, or repealed
- Redundant code/policies exist
- Current Downtown Guidelines cover a high level of Grand Connection content

Precedents

- Simplicity is key
- Emphasize unique experiences for each "room"
- Additional asks/requirements from developer/design teams

- "Pedestrian Corridor" guidelines

Transit Central


<u>Intent.</u> Transit Central functions as the Eastside's largest mobility hub and entryway to Downtown. This space is a convergence of activity, flanked by concourses that support a lively and active pedestrian-friendly environment. To achieve this, the room will:

- Serve as a welcoming, comfortable inter-modal hub between different transportation modes, punctuated by exceptional place-serving spaces for people to relax throughout the day.
- Celebrate all things related to mobility and movement.
- Include a mobility-focused and rhythmic development strategy, with an emphasis on design that is appreciated from transit vehicles and key arrival points.

COVID-19 and Equity Response



What is Resilience

- Ability for a community to identify highest shocks (acute) and stressors (ongoing), and create strategies to reduce impacts and/or quickly recover
- Prioritizes supporting underserved and underrepresented communities



COVID-19 and Equity Response

- Core Team facilitated a resilience prioritization exercise
- Based off of 100RC methodology from Rockefeller Foundation
- Suggested intentional emphasis on previously identified elements, such as
 - ✓ multi-lingual elements,
 - ✓ ecological health,
 - ✓ pedestrian health,
 - \checkmark spaces that facilitate different civic/cultural activities, and
 - ✓ improved wayfinding



Next Steps

- Summer: Gather input and conduct "testing" of draft guidelines/standards with community/stakeholders
- September: Review draft materials with Planning Commission that incorporates initial community/stakeholder feedback; refine draft and ready for hearing
- October: Formal public hearing and Commission recommendation for Council adoption
