U.S. EPA announces final cleanup plan for Quendall Terminals Superfund site

EPA is releasing our final plan to clean up the Quendall Terminals in Renton, a former creosote manufacturing plant and oil storage facility along Lake Washington, where for decades creosote, coal tar, and other hazardous chemicals accumulated on the land, in groundwater, and in lake sediments.

The cleanup plan for the upland portion of the site will include smoldering combustion, in-situ solidification, and soil capping and will cost approximately \$66 million. Cleanup of the contaminated in-water portion of the site includes dredging, an engineered sand cap, and enhanced natural recovery and will cost approximately \$40 million. Both estimates include the cost of monitoring the remedy to ensure it is effective for 100 years.

We held a public comment period from September 9 through November 8, 2019, on our proposal to clean up the site. In response to comments received on the proposed cleanup plan, EPA refined some aspects of our preferred alternative for the upland part of the site. The comments we received and our responses to them are available in the Record of Decision, Part 3, the Responsiveness Summary.
