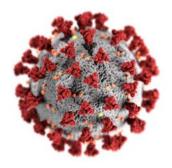

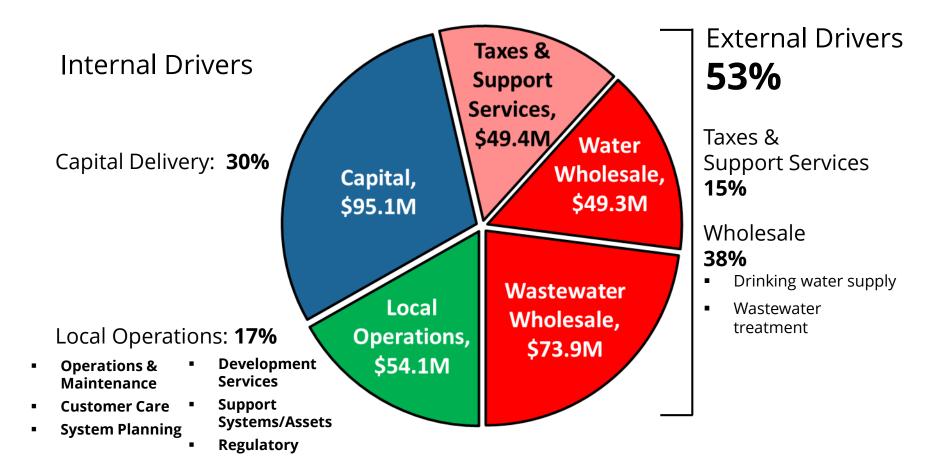

Managing Aging Infrastructure

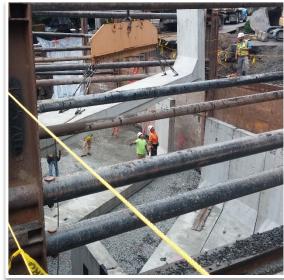
Not too soon, not too late

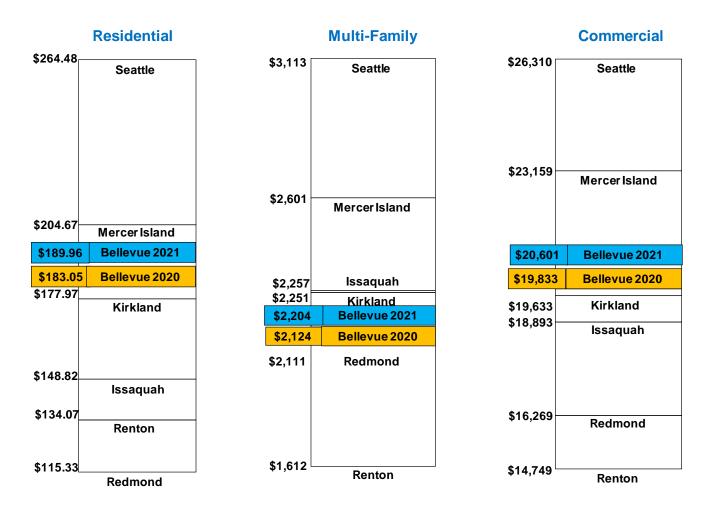

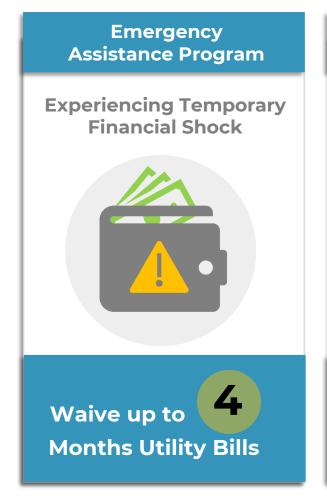

2020 Combined Water, Sewer, & Storm Monthly Bill (Proposed 2021 bill for Bellevue only)

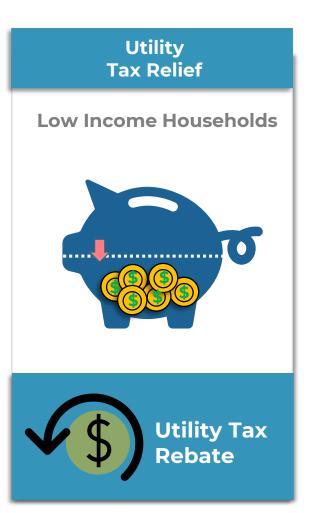
