

Human Services Policies

- Preventative services
- Continuum of human service needs
- Benefiting low- and moderate-income residents
- Welcoming, safe and just community
- Fairness and equity provided to those disproportionately affected by poverty, discrimination and victimization
- Coordinate with local, regional, and national efforts
- Network of service points, easily accessible, geographically distributed and proximate to public transit







Affordable Housing Need

Human Services Needs Update 2019:


75% of survey respondents rate lack of affordable housing as #1 community problem compared to 68% in 2015, 51% in 2013


Survey of Businesses 2019:

- All business sectors rate Bellevue worse than other local cities for affordable housing options- workforce housing primary challenge
- This rating has increased each year, significantly higher than 2015
- 42% had difficulty finding trained/ qualified staff (48% retail, 63% tourism)

All Bellevue Households

Bellevue Senior Households





- Almost one third (31%) of all Bellevue households spend more than 30% of their income on housing.
- 16% all renters & almost 1/3 senior renters spend more than 50% of income on housing.

Local workers earning \$15 - \$20/hour



Barista \$11.09/hr



Grocery Clerk \$13.95/hr



Cook \$13.37/hr



Cust. Service Representative \$18.68/hr



Bookkeeper \$21.21/hr



Medical Assistant \$18.65/hr

Workers earning less than \$15 hour or \$31,000 annually can only afford rent of less than \$800 month

Workers earning about \$20 hour or \$42,000 annually can only afford rent of about \$1,000 month




Leveraged Sources of Money

- ARCH Process
- Regional Collaboration
- Less cost/subsidy per unit created
- More total units created
- Coordinated Entry Requirements

COB Funds

- More nimble
- Possibility to fund projects with more specific populations served

Human Services Gaps

2019-2020 Human Services Needs Update:

- -Focus on root causes: mental health and substance use disorder treatment
- -20% of respondents: mental health is a major or moderate concern
- -67% of providers: clients need mental health care but can't afford it



Regional Collaboration and Outreach



Components of Outreach

Regional Collaboration

- Work with King Co to evaluate areas of common service delivery
- Coordinate Human Service approach

Developer Outreach

- Conduct outreach to understand developer interest in projects (or components) which may be fundable
- Work with partner agencies (ARCH, KCHA etc) to understand funding gap needs



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Next Steps

- Study sessions with City Council scheduled for every 3-5 weeks, starting in January
- Begin public outreach and collaboration
- Begin work on consolidation of policies for interest statement adoption
- Return to City Council in January



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
