Whereas: During Black History Month, we recognize and celebrate the many achievements and

contributions made by Black people to our nation's social, artistic, cultural, political and

economic advancement; and

Whereas: In 1976, Black History Month was formally adopted to honor and affirm the importance of

Black history throughout the American experience; and

Whereas: The observance of Black History Month calls our attention to the continued need to battle

racism and build a more just society that lives up to our democratic ideals; and

Whereas: The events of this past year remind us that we have far to go to end racial injustice and

inequity in our nation and local communities; and

Whereas: The City of Bellevue is committed to ensuring access, equity, inclusion and opportunity for

all; and

Whereas: As part of this commitment, the City Council undertook a pledge in June 2020 to take a fresh

look at use of force policies in policing, to ensure Black, Indigenous and people of color are

safe, respected and served equitably; and

Whereas: We welcome our community's participation in this crucial process to realize Bellevue's mission

to "welcome the world," celebrate Black history as an important part of American history, and

achieve justice and equity for all members of our community; and

Whereas: We strive to raise awareness of the history and contributions of communities of color, most

recently with a Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Summit, a Black History Month panel and a virtual adaptation of the American History Traveling Museum: The Unspoken Truths,

available until March 31, 2021, through the city's website;

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of the City of Bellevue, Washington, and on behalf of its City Council, do hereby proclaim the **month of February 2021** as:

Black History Month

and urge all residents to join us as we reflect on our shared history; commemorate and reaffirm the contributions of Black people to our communities, our country, and to the world; and continue efforts to battle racism and to build a society that is more just, peaceful and prosperous for all.
