### **HB 1590 Funding Opportunities**

At least 60% of the funding must be spent on facilities and programs that serve specific populations at or below 60% AMI:

#### Construction

- Affordable housing
- Housing-related services
- Mental and behavioral healthrelated facilities

# No more than 40% may be spent on: Operation, delivery, or evaluation of

- Mental and behavioral health treatment programs
- Housing-related services

#### **Operations and Maintenance**

- New affordable housing
- Housing-related programs
- New evaluation and treatment centers

Housing with supportive services to increase housing stability through:

- Housing stability case management
- Mental heath and/or substance use counseling
- Daily meals

- Maintain housing
- Support recovery and resiliency
- Maximize ability to work, live, and thrive in the community

### Variety of Housing Types and Needs

Spectrum of housing types to serve specific populations:

- Affordable housing at 0-30% AMI
- Permanent supportive housing
- Housing with supportive services
