HB 1590 Funding Opportunities

At least 60% of the funding must be spent on facilities and programs that serve specific populations at or below 60% AMI:

Construction

- Affordable housing
- Housing-related services
- Mental and behavioral health-related facilities

Operations and Maintenance

- New affordable housing
- Housing-related programs
- New evaluation and treatment centers

No more than 40% may be spent on:
Operation, delivery, or evaluation of

- Mental and behavioral health treatment programs
- Housing-related services

Housing with supportive services to increase housing stability through:

- Housing stability case management
- Mental health and/or substance use counseling
- Daily meals



Mental/Behavioral Health Services On-Site



- Enhance quality of life
- Maintain housing
- Support recovery and resiliency
- Maximize ability to work, live, and thrive in the community

Variety of Housing Types and Needs

Spectrum of housing types to serve specific populations:

- Affordable housing at 0-30% AMI
- Permanent supportive housing
- Housing with supportive services

Wraparound, Holistic Services

Services that support the unique needs and challenges of the individual and family in order to retain housing:

- Mental/behavioral health services
- Life skills
- Job placement and training



Culturally Specific and Responsive Services



Relevant values, expectations, and norms of diverse communities are present and considered during direct service and support

Housing for households in recovery and exiting inpatient care



Mental and Behavioral Health Services in the Field

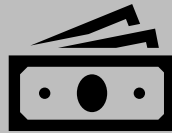
Enhanced services in the field to improve access to treatment and follow up with clients

Key Findings

Flexible financial assistance and services



Supportive services to enhance housing stability



Flexible Financial Assistance and Services

Examples that can help individuals obtain and/or maintain housing stability include:

- Rental assistance
- Move-in costs
- Eviction prevention



Supportive Services



Supportive services that help households achieve self-sufficiency, potential, and housing stability:

- Employment services
- Case management
- Tenant education



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- Stakeholder outreach and discussions (regional partners, for-profit and non-profit housing developers, faith-based organizations)
- Final stakeholder analysis with program goal and objective recommendations; and early wins
