

Strives to promote design excellence in our community Provides common language to enable efficient dialogue and review between the public, City, and Developers for potential/active projects







Topic 1 – General Requirements apply to both the Grand Connection and Major Public Open Spaces


- 24-hour public access required
- Temporary café seating allowed during business hours
- Space above and beneath may be developed when development is not in conflict with pedestrian use and access





Topic 2 – Grand Connection Route, Rooms, and Major Public Open Space Locations

- Grand Connection route established, consistent with current LUC
- "Rooms" within the Grand Connection specified and serve as character zones
- Major Public Open Space (MPOS) size and location is consistent with current LUC
- Design Review required for the Grand Connection and/or MPOS approval





Topic 3 – Grand Connection Guidelines and Standards

The guidelines and standards apply to the Grand Connection to ensure a cohesive design strategy for Sequence One

- 2. Ecological Framework
- 3. Fixtures
- 4. Paving

- Reflects update process, including audits, precedents, and stakeholder review/testing
- Removes redundant language
- Serves to replace Pedestrian Corridor and Major Public Open Space Design Guidelines (73 page document)




Topic 4 – Room Specific Guidelines and Standards

- Suggestive of what the designs should look like


