EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

State law (RCW 35.77.010) requires all local jurisdictions to annually adopt a six-year program of transportation improvements, known as the Local TIP, by the end of June each year. On April 8, 2021, the Transportation Commission hosted a public hearing and recommended adoption of the proposed 2022-2027 Local TIP.

RECOMMENDATION

Move to adopt Resolution No. 9932


BACKGROUND/ANALYSIS

<u>Local TIPs are not revenue constrained.</u> In most instances, projects must be included on a Local TIP to be eligible for state and federal grant programs.

The recommended City of Bellevue 2022-2027 TIP update is presented by the Transportation Commission for Council's review and adoption.

The six-year Local TIP serves as an inventory of projects and a rough work plan for the development of local transportation systems and, as such, represents an important planning component under the State's Growth Management Act. The Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) and Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC) use Local TIPs as a tool for coordinating the transportation programs of local jurisdictions with those of regional agencies. PSRC monitors Local TIPs for projects of regional significance (to be modeled for air quality conformity) and projects supported by federal funds. These projects are incorporated into the Regional TIP, which is then forwarded for inclusion in the State TIP. In most instances, projects must be included on a Local TIP to be eligible for state and federal grant programs. Council adopted the current 2021-2026 Local TIP at its July 6, 2020 meeting (Resolution No. 9784).

The diagram below depicts the relationship between Bellevue's Local TIP and the City's multi-phased transportation planning and capital programming process, including the Capital Investment Program (CIP) and Transportation Facility Plan (TFP).



Boxes on the left depict the stages of transportation project development, from policy development and planning, to project prioritization, funding and implementation.

<u>TFP</u>

The highest priority projects identified in sub-area long-range plans are included in the Citywide 12-year TFP, a financially constrained plan. Projects in the TFP form the basis for Transportation Impact Fee calculations and a Citywide environmental analysis of projected land use and traffic growth, which is used in the City's development review procedures.

TFP projects are prioritized again, along with other projects – scoped to address emerging operational, safety and maintenance needs identified by City staff, the public or other sources – before implementation funding is allocated in the seven-year Capital Investment Program (CIP) Plan.

TIP

Because **Local TIPs are <u>not</u> revenue constrained**, jurisdictions can include projects they would choose to implement within the timeframe, if funding were available. Attached is the recommended City of Bellevue 2022-2027 Local TIP which is comprised primarily of a project list. The comprehensive list includes four sections of projects:

- Section I. TIP Reference Nos. 1-32: Uncompleted projects included in the Adopted 2021-2027
 Capital Investment Program Plan full or partial funding secured;
- Section II. TIP Reference Nos. 33-62: Unfunded projects included in the Adopted 2019-2030 TFP:
- Section III. TIP Reference Nos. 63-107: Other unfunded local projects identified in the Comprehensive Transportation Project List or scoped by completed Alternative Analyses and Planning or Pre-design Studies; and,
- Section IV. TIP Reference Nos. 108-112: Regional or Outside Agency-led projects in which the City may choose to participate financially.

There are 26 new projects and two new project descriptions recommended to be added to the TIP as follows:

- 15 projects (TIP Nos. 4a, 21a-d, 22-25, 28a-e and 31) are new CIP projects. These projects would be added to Section I of the TIP;
- 11 projects (TIP Nos. 97-107) are 2022-2033 TFP candidate projects. These projects would be added to Section III of the TIP;
- One project description (TIP No. 21e) was revised to reflect the updates for the proposed Congestion Reduction Program Project. This project description would be revised in Section I of the TIP; and
- One project description (TIP No. 39) was revised to reflect updates from the Eastgate Transportation Study. This project description would be revised in Section II of the TIP.

Seven projects are recommended to be removed from the current 2021-2026 TIP as they will be substantially completed by the end of 2021, are not listed in the Comprehensive Plan's Comprehensive Transportation Project List, they have been discontinued by the State or the City's position has already been defined elsewhere in the TIP.

The project costs listed in the "Project Funding Categories" columns of the attachment represent, in most cases, the actual level of funding budgeted or estimated to be needed by the City during the six-year timeframe of the Local TIP. Exceptions to this method are the placeholder figures utilized for the costs associated with several TIP projects including TIP Reference Nos. 28 (Neighborhood Sidewalk Program), 63 (Pedestrian and Bicycle Implementation Initiative) and all projects in Section IV (101-104); (Regional or Outside Agency-Led Projects in which the City may choose to participate financially). These figures provide general placeholders for currently unsecured funding necessary to advance implementation or interagency coordination on these broader plans and projects. Because the Local TIP is not revenue constrained, project costs are given one of two designations:

- <u>Secured Funding</u>. Projects with secured funding have local or other sources of funding dedicated to support full or partial project implementation.
- <u>Unsecured Funding</u>. This designation reflects the portion of project costs that have no dedicated source of funding. Projects with unsecured funding at any level are included on the list for planning purposes, should funding become available within the six-year timeframe.

TIP Public Hearing before the Transportation Commission

A Public Hearing on the recommended City of Bellevue 2022-2027 TIP was held as part of the Transportation Commission's April 8 meeting. Two interested citizens testified at the hearing. After the public testimony and thorough discussion, the Transportation Commission approved the recommended TIP project list.

<u>Transportation Commission Recommendation</u>

By unanimous vote at their April 8 meeting, and as further described in the attached transmittal memorandum, the Transportation Commission recommends Council adoption of the recommended City of Bellevue 2022-2027 TIP.

POLICY & FISCAL IMPACTS

Policy Impact

State law

RCW 35.77.010 mandates that all local jurisdictions annually adopt and submit to the state a six-year program of transportation improvements, known as the Local TIP.

Comprehensive Plan

Adopting the annual TIP directly supports Comprehensive Plan Policy TR-131 to "Seek state and federal funds for transportation capital, maintenance, and operations." To be eligible to seek federal and state funding, the City must comply with state law and adopt an annual TIP.

Fiscal Impact

There is no direct fiscal impact of adopting the 2022-2027 TIP. However, it is often a pre-requisite that projects be listed on an approved TIP to become eligible for federal and state grant funding programs.

OPTIONS

- 1. Adopt the Resolution adopting the City of Bellevue 2022-2027 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
- 2. Do not adopt the Resolution and provide alternative direction to staff. Failure to adopt an updated Local TIP before July 1 would cause the City to be out of compliance with state law and potentially jeopardize the City's ability to seek grant funding for transportation projects.
