Whereas: There are approximately 800,000 law enforcement officers serving in communities across

the United States, including the dedicated members of the Bellevue Police Department;

and

Whereas: Since the first recorded death in 1791, nearly 22,000 law enforcement officers in the United

States have made the ultimate sacrifice and been killed in the line of duty; and

Whereas: 394 new names of fallen heroes are being added to the National Law Enforcement Officers

Memorial this spring, including 295 (182 fatalities are COVID-19 related) officers killed in

2020 and 99 officers killed in previous years; and

Whereas: The service and sacrifice of all officers killed in the line of duty will be honored during the

National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund's 33rd Annual Candlelight Vigil, on May

13; and

Whereas: May 15 is designated as Peace Officers Memorial Day, in honor of all fallen officers and their

families and U.S. flags should be flown at half-staff; and

Whereas: Law enforcement officers are a vital part of our communities, standing ready to deal with

emergencies and risk their own safety and health to protect us every day; and

Whereas: Law enforcement officers continue to diligently perform essential work on the frontlines

alongside dedicated first responders and healthcare workers to respond to the current

public health emergency caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of the City of Bellevue, Washington, and on behalf of its City

Council, do hereby proclaim the week of May 9-15, 2021 as:
