queer/questioning (LGBTQ) people, both in our community and nationally, have been

critical to advancing equity; and

COVID-19 is present in the community and throughout our nation; and

Whereas: In solidarity with the LGBTQ community, the City of Bellevue will raise and fly pride flags

at City Hall and several other city-owned facilities during the month of June and works

with community partners to place pride banners in downtown corridors.
