


Root Causes

Gaps and Challenges

 Limited places for individuals to stabilize until they can access permanent housing

Proactive vs. Reactive homelessness response

- Limited permanent housing with supportive services for low-income clients (i.e., fixed income)
 - 335 regulated units in the 0-30% AMI range
 - In 2017, 5670 HHs in Bellevue with incomes within 0-30% AMI range
