Washington, one in six adults lack the basic skills needed to get a livable wage

job; and

Whereas: While the literacy rate in Washington and the Seattle area is relatively high, it is

an issue for the poorest residents, including immigrants and refugees who

weren't able to complete school in their native countries; and

Whereas: Only 14% of foreign-born adults living in Seattle with limited English proficiency

are employed; and

Whereas: In King County, organizations such as Literacy Source provide free, learner-

centered basic education to more than 1,000 low-income adults each year. Adult

education and family literacy programs help adults obtain a high school

equivalence degree and prepare for postsecondary education or training; and

Whereas: By promoting adult education and family literacy, we can ensure that all parents

in East King County are prepared to help their children read medicine bottles,

navigate public transportation and complete homework for school.
