Whereas: Domestic violence is a serious crime that affects one in four women and one in seven men

during their lifetime through severe physical violence; and

Whereas: On average, 20 people per minute experience sexual assault, physical violence, or stalking

by an intimate partner in the U.S. That's more than 10 million people a year; and

Whereas: Domestic violence is widespread and has a devastating impact on survivors, children,

families and our community; and

Whereas: Domestic violence does not discriminate and crosses all economic, racial, gender,

educational, religious and societal barriers, and is sustained by indifference; and

Whereas: Ending the cycle of this vicious crime requires the courage of survivors and the support of

the larger community; and

Whereas: Education, prevention and intervention efforts to end the cycle of domestic violence are

imperative to not only protect survivors but also to increase public awareness of the

severity and extent of domestic violence.

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of the City of Bellevue, Washington, and on behalf of its City Council, do hereby proclaim the month of **October 2021** as:

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE ACTION MONTH

in Bellevue. I urge all citizens to speak out against domestic violence and support local efforts, including those by LifeWire, an agency that provides domestic violence survivor support from housing to legal advocacy to mental health therapy, towards preventing and ending domestic abuse in our communities and increasing public awareness of, and action on, this issue.
