- Indigenous people have lived in the Puget Sound region for time beyond Whereas: memory; and
- As a community we acknowledge the land we are on is the ancestral homelands Whereas: of the Coast Salish people, the traditional home of all tribes and bands within the Duwamish Tribe of Indians and Snoqualmie Indian Tribe; and
- We take this opportunity to express our deepest respect to the original Whereas: caretakers of this land, who continue to live here, and honor their heritage; and
- Indigenous people have and continue to make significant contributions to the Whereas: region through science, technology, literature, the environment and the arts; and
- Whereas: A delegation of Indigenous people to the United Nations-sponsored International Conference on the Discrimination Against Indigenous Peoples conference proposed Indigenous Peoples Day in 1977; and
- Whereas: In 1992, the municipality of Berkeley, California became the first municipality to celebrate Indigenous Peoples Day; and
- Whereas: The City of Bellevue is committed to upholding the values of access, equality, inclusion and opportunity for local and regional Native Americans, Alaska Natives and Indigenous communities; and

Now, therefore, I, Lynne Robinson, Mayor of the City of Bellevue, Washington, and on behalf of its City Council, do hereby proclaim the Oct. 11, 2021 as:

Indigenous People's Day

in Bellevue and urge all residents to reflect on the history and contributions of Indigenous people. The city further reaffirms its commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion and serving everyone in our community.
