20 is an annual vigil that takes place around the world to honor and remember all transgender community members lost to violence in the

Whereas: At least 44 transgender people in the United States were killed by violence so

far this year, according to the Human Rights Campaign, a group that has tracked fatal violence against transgender individuals since 2013; and

up to Transgender Day of Remembrance, transgender people and their allies
